The October 1 student count at Eastford Elementary School was 133. One elementary student attended Charles H. Barrows STEM Academy. The October 1 count of Eastford students at Woodstock Academy was 55. Eastford high school students also attended the following schools: six attended Harvard H. Ellis Technical High School; two attended Killingly Regional Agricultural Center; one attended Windham Technical School and one attended Quinebaug Valley Middle College High School.

#### 2015-16 Eastford Elementary School Goal

To improve student achievement through the inclusion of cross-curricular performance tasks that require students to demonstrate and apply their knowledge and skills. All teachers will create and contribute tasks that directly connect to the 'claims' reported in the SBAC results to improve student performance.

#### **Goals and Accomplishments**

- 1. This report highlights some of the accomplishments; more can be accessed online by reading committee reports and the principal/superintendent reports on the Board of Education's dropdown menu on the school's website (http://www.eastfordct.org)
- 2. During the 2015-16 school year, numerous facilities projects were completed; these include:
  - a. The Board of Education requisitioned plans and went out to bid for two items on its long-term list of highest priority capital projects—the replacement of the underground oil storage tank and the digging of a new well.

- b. The temporary classroom, which is not ADA accessible, was converted to a storage room and a panel was installed on the stage to allow the stage to be used as a general music and band room.
- c. Much work was accomplished toward the long-term goal of ensuring that the building is more energy efficient. These discussions led to preliminary planning for upgrades to the heating systems.
- 3. The Board finished a five-year review of all policies, which culminated in the review of bylaws during the 2015-16 school year. Updated policies are delineated in monthly minutes of the Board of Education and access to all policies is on the website.
- 4. The Board rejuvenated its Scholarship Steering Committee and began collaborating with the Community Foundation of Eastern Connecticut to establish a non-endowed scholarship fund as a companion to one of its endowed funds.

#### Personnel

- 1. A new School Social Worker, Karen Bergin was hired to begin the 2015-16 School Year.
- 2. During the 2015-16 school year, custodian Robert Willis resigned and Charles Bowen was hired to take his place.
- 3. Since the Board of Education was unable to hire a Spanish teacher to fill the vacancy, students in grades seven and eight participated in online instruction with teachers of Spanish, French, Chinese and Latin.

#### **Professional Development**

Professional Development opportunities for the staff during the 2015-16 school year focused on achieving the annual school goal as well as increasing the capacity of teachers to facilitate the development of students' 21st Century Skills by differentiating classroom instruction and incorporating performance tasks and increased rigor into instruction. Staff members participated in a variety of professional development activities. These included:

- 1. For the August Professional Development Day, teachers
  - a. Participated in mandated trainings related to child abuse and safety;
  - b. Discussed Technology skills progression that had been developed in the summer;
  - c. Continued work on Writing Pathways Units of Study; and
  - d. Joined Woodstock Academy and other sending schools for a motivational speaker; John Perricone.
- 2. The October and March Professional Development Days were designed to allow opportunities for the Eastford teachers to collaborate on the

implementation of the *Writing Pathways Units of Study* and the NWEA: MAP (Northwest Evaluation Association: Measure of Academic Progress)

- a. Lori Reynolds provided a workshop in response to the teachers' desire to learn how to better support reluctant writers. She also incorporated technological resources that can be used to engage students in discussions.
- b. Elizabeth Rhynhart and Lori Crocker-Lincoln provided opportunities for teachers to explore the Learning Continuum resource and the new Quadrant Report in NWEA Maps. The report places students on a grid to identify whether they are high achievement/high growth, high achievement/low growth, low achievement/high growth or low achievement/low growth in each of the tested areas.
- 3. The District received an instructional coach grant from the Connecticut State Department of Education, which allowed teachers to collaborate with Donna Drasch, consultant from EASTCONN, to continue developing activities designed to increase the rigor of instruction in Mathematics and English Language Arts. These coaching opportunities occurred over ten sessions throughout the school year.
- 4. Melissa Lessard maintained trainer certification in PMT (Physical and Psychological Management Training) and coached other staff members who renewed their certifications in PMT. In this program, staff members learn appropriate ways to deescalate students and moderate behavioral incidents with students.
- 5. In addition to scheduled professional development days, staff members completed other professional development activities that are highlighted in the principal's monthly reports available on the school's website.

- 1. The Eastford School District is fortunate to have TelePresence videoconferencing equipment. This equipment allows students to participate in workshops and courses as well as take field trips via Internet and video technology. - 2. Eastford Elementary School continues to utilize technology in all academic areas since there are more than 100 laptops available to students and all classrooms are equipped with interactive SmartBoards and at least one iPad.

#### **Cultural Programs**

Students at all grade levels attended theater productions at the Hyde Theater. Eastford Elementary School hosted a variety of cultural programs during the 2015-16 school year, many of which were made possible with funding from the PTO. These included:

- Winter Holiday laser-light show.

#### **Cocurricular Programs**

- 1. Three sports seasons were offered for middle school students fall, winter and spring— two soccer teams, two basketball teams and a coed track team.
- 2. Northeast Communities against Substance Abuse (NECASA) provided Eastford's Local Prevention Council (LPC) grant money to support local prevention of substance abuse. Research has shown that when youngsters learn how to use leisure time effectively, they are less likely to abuse drugs and alcohol. During the 2015-16 school year, the funds were used to sponsor after school/holiday enrichment programs. More than one-third of EES students participated in after school programs such as scarecrow

decorations, origami, soap carving, model rockets and birdhouses, holiday crafts and Legos. There were 20 sessions offered across all grade levels. Additionally, the LPC sponsored two field trips on the Professional Development Days to the Children's Museum in West Hartford and the EcoTarium in Worcester.

- 3. Catie Botting, a parent and drama enthusiast, organized a successful Drama program for EES students. Fourteen students participated in drama activities that culminated in a final showcase performance.
- 4. During the 2015-16 school year, the Board of Education facilitated the Before and After School Program for the fifth year. Melinda King was the primary childcare worker and Mikaila Shirshac, Kathryn LaRose, Carla Harrington and Alaina Kilburn assisted.
- 5. Carole McCombe, Candice Mead, Juliana Fox, Lori Reynolds, Lori Crocker Lincoln and Meribeth Tedisky facilitated a well-established Homework Club four days per week.

#### **Special Event**

Families and community members were invited to participate in a S.T.E.A.M.M. (Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts, Mathematics and More) Night hosted by Candice Mead and Joan Muller in April 2016. Many staff members participated in the evening's overall success. Student work was available for parents to observe and community members and organizations provided information on science topics and environmental issues. More than 200 people attended.

#### **Parent Groups**

The Eastford Elementary School continued to enjoy the support of three active parent groups:

- 1. Among other projects, the Eastford PTO sponsored cultural programs, a school sign contest, Bike to School Day, and community outreach and book fairs
- 2. The Middle School fund-raising group sponsored its fourteenth Annual Goods and Services Auction to raise money to completely fund the eighthgrade trip to Washington, D.C.
- 3. The Sports Boosters supported the soccer, basketball and track teams by providing equipment that was not included in the Board of Education's budget. In addition, the Sports Boosters sponsored a pasta dinner and magazine fund-raiser.

#### **Ongoing Committees and Collaborative Initiatives**

The following represent ongoing efforts that involve the Board of Education and Eastford Elementary Staff working collaboratively with parents and other

#### stakeholders:

- 1. Professional Development and Curriculum Committee: Lori Crocker-Lincoln led this committee that also included Elizabeth Rhynhart, Juliana Fox, Michelle Bibeault, Gerald Marmat, Heather Tamsin and Linda Loretz. This team ensures that individualized goals for intervention are developed by math, reading and writing teachers and shared with parents six times per year—each time progress notes and report cards are issued. The team also facilitates curriculum development and overall school improvement.
- 2. The Readiness Council, which is governed by the Board of Education and the Town, is a group of citizens concerned with matters related to children who are not yet school-aged. It is the duty of the Readiness Council to develop and implement policies for and to provide ongoing monitoring of the School Readiness Preschool Program. Readiness Council members included Jacki Budd, Catherine Depercio, Jennifer Barlow, Janelle Marengo, Jenn Norman, Linda Loretz, Terry Cote, Ashlyn Ellsworth, Christine Kopplin, Heather Tamsin, Susan Shead, Robin Bibeault and Michelle Bibeault.
- 3. Eastford Elementary School continued to work closely with the Eastford Independent Fire Company. Gordon Spink, Eastford Fire Chief, was instrumental in improving overall safety guidelines. Jeannine Spink worked closely with staff in keeping CPR and First Aid certifications up-to-date as well as meeting with all classes regarding fire safety and first aid.
- 4. Members of the Congregational Church of Eastford provided multiple after-school enrichment programs for students. The youth group from the Eastford Baptist Church offered volunteer services to the school and provided an outdoor cleanup during the 2015-16 school year.
- 5. A long-term collaboration with the Union School District for sports and the Washington, D.C. trip recently expanded to include student dances and other activities.
- 6. A collaborative arrangement has been established with the Pomfret School District to share a Pupil Services Director.
- 7. The Eastford School District continues to share a media specialist/school librarian with the Hampton School District. Additionally, it shares a music teacher with the Plainfield School District.
