







South Campus

- Summer Programs (athletics, STEAM, leadership, political science, Spanish, etc.)






Salaries and Benefits	\$400,000 Increase	No additional teaching staff; required contractual increases.
Instruction	\$27,640 Decrease	The IPad program has allowed us to continue to reduce costs in textbooks and other instructional supply purchases.
Transportation	\$21,155 Decrease	Savings in transportation were the results of switching providers and purchasing our own transportation; we continue to search for savings in this area.
Facilities	\$19,729 Increase	Upgrades to campus provide a modern experience on our histori campus.
Debt Service	0	3.41% of the operating budget is debt. Sending towns pay approximately 30% of the total debt for the new campus.

Private revenue adds diversity to The Academy and helps us to meet our Mission and Vision.

Impact on Sending Town Tuition

 Approximately \$1.8 Million is transferred to Operating Budget, reducing sending town tuition by \$1,800 per student.

Staffing

- Private revenue benefits all students, as it provides for a minimum of one teacher from each department and one counselor.
- All students benefit from the extra courses being offered (AP Calculus, ELL, etc.). Facilities
 - Private revenue covers the cost for the south campus, minus 30% of the debt in the Operating Budget.

Enrollment Management

 To maintain maximum efficiency and assist sending districts, there is funding for Public Relations and Marketing, which continues to show success.





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
