School Year

August 29, 2022, marked the first day for the staff of Eastford Elementary School and on August 30 we welcomed our students. The 2022-2023 school year included 182 student days and 186 certified staff days.

Student Enrollment

- 1. The total student enrollment as of October 1, 2022 for the Eastford School District was 218.
- 2. The October 1, 2022 student count at Eastford Elementary School was 152.
- 3. The October 1, 2022 count of Eastford students at Woodstock Academy was 49.
- 4. The October 1, 2022 student count for other high schools, including magnet schools and outplacements, was 17. Other high schools include Ellis Technical, Killingly Vocational, E.O. Smith, QMC and ACT.

Readiness- Pre School

- The Readiness Program had 17 students enrolled. Eleven students were 4-yearolds who will move on to kindergarten in 2023-2024. Six will remain in PK with space for eleven newcomers.
- Preschool held an Orientation evening on May 18, 2023 for those who will be attending in 2023-2024. There were also several transition activities planned to assist the current preschoolers in their transition to kindergarten.

• The Readiness Council met the first Tuesday of each month at 5:30 PM via Zoom from September-June. The Council updated policies and procedures to be ready for NAEYC re-accreditation in the spring of 2024. The Council recently discussed raising the cap on Readiness Fees. Readiness fees will be capped at \$130 per week, and with next year's class we will begin charging students who receive special education services for their time in the program that is outside of their service hours.

Teacher Evaluation

The CSDE once again allowed for flexibility in teacher and administrator growth and evaluation for the 2022-2023 school year. Adoption of the Flexibilities was approved by our Professional Development and Evaluation Committee (PDEC) and the Board of Education.

Professional Development

Professional development opportunities for the staff were provided on designated Professional Development days as well as through released time during the school year. These activities are carefully selected and/or planned to advance our Strategic Plan and align with district and school goals. Highlights of our professional development opportunities included:

- August 29 and September 2 Professional Development included:
 - Support from EastConn staff to continue our work from last year on SEL, developing meaningful learning targets that integrate SEL and curriculum standards, acclimating new staff (6 certified and 3 paraprofessionals).
 - Work with consultant Sonia Greene, Ph.D. on understanding student behavior and helping students learn to self-monitor and self-regulate their emotions and behavior.
 - Training from Illustrative Mathematics (IM) for math teachers on launching the new math program in grades K-8.
 - Overview of updated manuals, plans and curriculum documents and resources.
 - Updated Covid requirements and protocols.
 - Mandated trainings.
 - Security protocols.
- October 7 Professional Development Day for all staff featured:
 - Work with EastConn on incorporating learning targets that integrate our Portrait of a Learner with our academic curriculum and developing rubrics to monitor student acquisition of Portrait of a Learner traits.
 - Math Team collaboration and check-in with EastConn on using the new math materials.

- Work with Sonia Greene, Ph.D. to move students toward independence in recognizing and addressing behaviors (self-regulation, executive function) that detract from learning.
- Michelle Bibeault assisted staff in understanding the format of and evolution of the International Society of Technology in Education (ISTE) Standards for technology.
- On February 17, 2023 there was an early dismissal day for staff professional development in the afternoon. Staff participated in CPR refresher training, ELA and math support, and work on materials that support students with student-led conferences.
- On May 12, 2023 there was an early dismissal day for staff professional development in the afternoon. Math teachers worked with EastConn staff to compile a pacing guide to monitor our implementation of the new IM math program as we go into our second year of using these materials. Middle school teachers reviewed feedback on student led conferences and planned for improvements for next school year.
- <u>Staff Development Opportunities throughout the year included:</u>
 - EastConn staff supported our math teachers throughout the year as they navigated our new math program, Illustrative Mathematics (IM). ELA teachers also received support on integrating Units of Study with our Portrait of a Learner.
 - Carole McCombe continued to work with EastConn staff on a regular basis to incorporate the Eastford "Portrait of a Learner" (POL) into our existing and developing curriculum documents and continue our work on building a positive learning community with the goal of developing students as "leaders of their own learning". Our strategic improvement plan was updated for 2022-2025. The plan was shared with staff and with the Curriculum Committee.
 - There was additional focus this year on The Science of Reading and new CSDE requirements that will impact reading and language arts curriculum and assessments beginning July 2023.
 - EastConn guided area districts in conducting an audit of our Language Arts programs and assessments in grades K-3 and supported us in aligning with recent legislation and CSDE requirements.
 - Carole McCombe attended a Leadership Retreat for Connecticut Administrators. Breakout sessions included information on the newly revised framework for Educator Growth and Evaluation, well-being in schools, using technology, and engaging students and families.

- Stephanie Murana and Carole McCombe attended training on Section 504 plans through SERC- the State Education Resource Center. Ms. Murana is the case manager for all the school 504 plans.
- Staff worked with Sonia Greene, Ph.D. to move students toward independence in recognizing and addressing behaviors (self-regulation, executive function) that detract from learning.
- Michelle Bibeault assisted staff in understanding the format of and evolution of the International Society of Technology in Education (ISTE) Standards for technology.
- Donna Leake attended meetings of the regional Superintendent's group as well as seminars offered for free by various law firms regarding recent legislation and the impact on district policies and procedures. She also attended the CABE/CAPSS Convention.

Curriculum

- Teachers of science, facilitated by our middle school science teacher, Candice Mead, evaluated and recommended for purchase updated science materials for students in grades K-8.
- Math teachers completed year one of using Illustrative Mathematics math materials. They met throughout the year to plan a pacing guide to ensure that all students are receiving instruction in all areas of the math standards.
- In the area of English/Language Arts, we will need to adjust our curricular materials and assessments for grades K-3 to better align with the Science of Reading legislation.

School Safety and Security Plan

The Safety and Security Committee, led by Charles Kernan, reviewed, updated, and submitted to the State our School Safety and Security Plan. An updated plan must be submitted for review and approval by November of each year.

Data on Student Progress

- This year, we piloted Student-led conferences for grades 5-8. A letter went home to families in February outlining this process. Teachers worked with students to prepare them to share information with families about their learning.
- Teachers in grades 3-8 utilized the Interim Assessment Blocks (IABs) to monitor student progress toward mastering standards. The IABs are resources from the State Department of Education, and they align with the standards and types of questions students see when they take the Smarter Balanced Assessments in the spring. Students also took the NWEA assessment in Language Arts, Math, and Science in March. These results are also used to monitor student progress toward mastering standards and to guide instruction.
- Below are the results of our students' performance on the State Assessments in Math, English Language Arts and Science.

Technology

In 2022-2023, we had approximately 160 computers in circulation: 90 Chromebooks and 70 Mac Airs. A new classroom projector, backup batteries, and 15 new Chromebooks were purchased to replace old units.

<u>Field Trips</u>

Our students participated in off-site field trips carefully planned by our staff members. Some examples of these trips are as follows:

- The Washington, D.C. trip took place from May 16 May 19, 2023. Students in both grade 7 and grade 8 attended. Mrs. Jennifer Barlow and Mrs. Catherine DePercio chaperoned this trip.
- Students in grades PK, 2, 3, and 4 took monthly walking trips to the Eastford Public Library on separate, designated days.
- Students in preschool, kindergarten, grade one and grade 2 traveled to the Ecotarium in Worcester, MA to participate in hands-on science activities.
- Students in grades 7 and 8 participated in an overnight trip to Mystic Seaport and spent the night on the Amistad.
- Students in grade 2 visited Buell's Orchard to learn about local economics as it relates to their social studies curriculum.
- Students in preschool and kindergarten visited the Eastford Independent Fire Company to learn more about fire safety and resources in our community.
- Students in grades 1 and 2 traveled to Creamery Brook Bison Farm in Brooklyn to learn about local agriculture.
- Students in grades 5-8 participated in team building activities at Mystic Seaport. These trips are free to students through a grant that Mystic Seaport offers to develop programs in rural communities.
- Students in grades 3, 4 and 5 traveled to Sturbridge Village for hands on agriculture and cooking programs and to experience life in a colonial New England village.
- Select students in grade 6 attended and performed at the Band Ensemble portion of the Connecticut Music Educators Association (CMEA) honors festival at the CT Convention Center.

Virtual Field Trips through the Center for Interactive Learning (CILC)

We are fortunate to have the technology to allow students to participate in a wide variety of virtual learning experiences. <u>Sports</u>

In the 2022-2023 school year, we had a co-ed soccer team in the fall that consisted of 14 boys and 3 girls. Over the winter, we had a co-ed basketball that consisted of 12 boys and 6 girls. These teams competed in the Quinebaug Valley Junior Conference (QVJC) league.

Primary Mental Health Project (PMHP)

The PMHP grant received last year was a two-year grant. The PALS program ran again this school year and Mrs. Sarah Boyd was our childcare associate who administered this program under the supervision of school counselor Ms. Murana.

Before and After School childcare program

<u>Before School Childcare:</u> Throughout the year we had numerous students participate in the Before School Childcare program. This program is offered from 7:00 AM to 8:20 AM and is funded by fees.

<u>After School Program</u>– Last year, we received a two year After School Grant. Therefore, this year we could continue to offer free After School programming for students in grades K-8. Many students participated in some aspects of the program throughout the year. The After School Grant funded multiple opportunities for student enrichment during the after school hours. In addition to basic childcare, we offered an art club, STEM programming, weekly visits by Mystic Seaport, once a month opportunity by Mystic Aquarium, visits from Ragged Hill Woods outdoor education center, Board Games and Academic Support on a regular basis. We were also able to offer Family engagement and workshop opportunities.

Summer Programming

EES was a busy place over the summer weeks. Extended School Year (ESY) services were provided to students for three weeks in July and August. Mrs. Patricia Moran, Mrs. Christine Kopplin, and Ms. Jennifer Daniels facilitated this program. For four weeks in July and August, as part of receiving a summer enrichment grant, a Summer STEM Enrichment program was offered in conjunction with Mystic Aquarium. In addition to on-site programming, students traveled to Mystic Aquarium or Mystic Seaport on Fridays during these weeks for hands on exploration of the classroom concepts. Mrs. Candice Mead facilitated this program.

Students also had the opportunity to participate in a summer sports camp organized by local church groups during the week of July 24.

Facilities

During the 2022-2023 school year:

- The school district entered a contract with EMCOR to provide an expanded yearly maintenance check of all HVAC related equipment.
- A Town Roof Committee which included: Robert Ellsworth (Chair), Steve Bowen, Paul Torcellini and Jim Trowbridge continued to meet and monitor the roof replacement, insulation, and PV project. The roof replacement and installation portions of the project were completed.
- Several other building repairs and security upgrades were completed: including the connection of a new heat pump, installation of a set of inner lower-level doors, upgrade of alarm system and other security focused items, installation of a new network server, and a new set of steps to the kindergarten play area.

Transportation

The 2022-2023 school year was the third year of our five-year contract with EastConn transportation for both daily and special education transportation services. In certain situations, we also needed to contract with additional providers for special education.

Policy

During the 2022-2023 school year, the Board continued to update policies in response to changes in State and Federal legislation, as recommended by our law firm, Shipman and Goodwin. Updated policies are delineated in monthly minutes of the Board of Education Policy Subcommittee and all policies can be accessed on our website. In addition to addressing policy changes in response to recent legislation, much of the work of the policy committee was focused on updating the 5000 Series and the Bylaws section of our policy book.

Finance

The Board of Education's operating budget for the 2022-2023 school year was \$4,212,627. The BOE was able to end the school year within its budgetary limits. The BOE returned \$30,000 to the Town and requested that the Town place it in a non-lapsing, unexpended Municipal Reserve Fund for the purpose of special education.

In addition to the operating budget, we received State and Federal Grants that support the educational programming we provide for our students. This year we received the following grants that are "typically" available to schools:

- in conjunction with the administration, celebrated all staff during the week of May 8-12 for Staff Appreciation Week with a luncheon and daily treats and surprises!
- with the assistance Lauren Barlow, Diane Barlow, and Cassie Roto, maintained the landscaping in front of the school planting, weeding, pruning, mulching, and watering as needed throughout the summer.
- sponsored the "Design the School Sign" contest.
- sponsored a spring bulb fundraiser.
- once again set up The Giving Tree in our school lobby. Proceeds supported local families and the Eastford Food Pantry.
- sponsored the Scholastic Book Fairs.
- organized the Annual Goods and Services Auction. There were raffle items, a bake sale, food truck and live and silent auctions. Proceeds were shared among students in grades 5-8 for their annual trip to Washington, D.C.
- sponsored a Birds of Prey assembly for all students.

Family and Community Outreach and Collaboration

1. <u>Outreach to families:</u>

The staff of ESS provides ongoing and timely communication to families though phone calls, conferenced, emails and a monthly school newsletter. Samples of additional outreach to families included:

- In August, our PK and Kindergarten teachers held a Meet and Greet for new students and families.
- In September, families were invited to an Open House program at Eastford Elementary School.
- Stephanie Murana, our school counselor, hosted a monthly grandparents' group at the school. Families with grandparents as the primary caregivers were invited to attend for coffee and conversation. She also offered a monthly "Parent University" to provide resources and support to our families.

- In May, both Preschool and Kindergarten held orientation evenings for incoming families. Free childcare was available for these events.
- In June, Stephanie Murana and Sarah Boyd hosted a family evening event for the students and families involved in the PALS program.

2. <u>Collaboration with the Community:</u>

- Sally Rogers presented a program for grades K and 1 about the Science of Sound.
- A representative from the CT State Police and Deb Richards, Eastford's Emergency Management Director assisted with our practice lockdown drill.
- Jeremy Barlow provided a huge amount of support to our custodians by helping spread 50 yards of mulch on the playground!
- Cody Rogers, a community member donated a copious amount of school supplies for office and staff and filled backpacks for students in need.
- Gary Whittenburg donated and delivered sand for our playground sandboxes.
- Dale Lundy and Chris Pittman waxed the floors in the lower level of the Town.
