From the Principal's Desk

Dear Families,

On Sunday, November 3, 2024 daylight savings time will end, and it will be getting dark as students are arriving home on the bus. Please use caution and remember to always stop when a bus has its red flashing lights on.

I hope that you are pleased with your child's photo proofs from Irvin Simon Photographers! If you have not been able to access your proofs, please let me know and we can assist you.

On November 8 we will have a short ceremony in the front of the school to reveal the winner of the PTO-sponsored school sign contest! Earlier in October, the entries were narrowed down to three finalists. All students had the opportunity to vote for their favorite sign out of the three finalists. I want to thank all the students who submitted entries this year. It is always a difficult task for our PTO to narrow the entries down to just three finalists! Congratulations to our three finalists, Zoe Labonte in grade 5, Rio Souvigney in grade 2, and A'vriella Barber in grade 1. On November 8 we will find out which sign students selected as the winning design!

As we move into the months of November and December, please refer to the school calendar for days when the school day is shortened or when there is no school due to holidays or professional development. Coming up quickly, there is no school on November 5 and November 11. There is also no school on November 27-29 for the Thanksgiving break.

First-trimester report cards will be distributed on **December 6. Parent-teacher conferences** will be held in the evening on Thursday, December 12, and in the

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afternoon on Friday, December 13. Friday, December 13 will be an early release day so **that teachers can discuss your child's progress with you**.

Teachers in grades pk-4 will provide you with an opportunity to sign up to conference with them on these days. Please look for further communication regarding conferences prior to the Thanksgiving break.

Students in grades 5-8 will conduct **Student-Led Conferences**. Student-led conferences are an opportunity for students to engage in their learning process and share with families their areas of strength and the areas that are challenging for them. Middle school teachers have been working with students to set goals and to monitor their academic progress. It is very important to our students that you find the time to visit so they can speak with you about their progress. They have been working hard to prepare this for you. The middle school team will be reaching out to families prior to Thanksgiving break to explain the process in more detail and to schedule appointments with you.

During your parent conference, feel free to ask teachers about some of the assessments that students have taken and about ways that teachers monitor student progress. In addition to routine classroom assessments, students in grades two through eight have participated in an **NWEA** (Northwest Education Association) assessment. This assessment has English/language arts and mathematics components, as well as a science component for students in grades 3-8. Assessments assist in determining the specific learning needs of individuals and groups, and combined with other academic data, help ensure that all students are making progress toward mastering academic standards.

Community Donations

Many local agencies have coats, clothing, food, toys/gifts available to families in need. If you, or a town resident you know, are in need of assistance, please contact the school counselor, Mrs. Schleicher, or me so we can make necessary arrangements to support you. We will also be reaching out to some families to be sure you have what you need for your children around the holidays.

Inclement Weather

On **no school and late opening days**, radio station WINY (1350 AM) and television channels WFSB and WVIT will carry announcements. We also post announcements on our website and **utilize our automatic notification alert system**. This system will allow for a voice message, a text and an email to be sent to all of our contacts. This system will be used, in addition to notifications on local media outlets, to notify families of school closings and any other unexpected events that may impact the opening or closing of school.

Please keep in mind that **when we close early for inclement weather,** we follow the directions that you gave us at the beginning of the year for dismissal of

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your child. It is very important that you talk with your children about what you want them to do on unexpected early dismissal days. If you would like to change any information that we have on file regarding who may take your children home, please send a note or call the office as soon as possible.

As the weather fluctuates through the seasons, it is important to send your children to school dressed appropriately. Unless the weather is deemed inclement (below 20 degrees or too wet), students are **expected to be able to participate in outdoor activities every day.** Indoor temperatures can also fluctuate quite a bit over the course of the day. Dressing in layers is a great way to remain comfortable all day.

Our Auction Committee has been working hard to prepare for our annual goods and services auction on November 16, 2024. This annual auction is our primary fundraiser that enables all students to attend their class trip in either grade 7 or grade 8 to Washington, D.C., with all expenses paid. It is very important that families of students in grades 5-8 get involved as the money raised is shared among these grades to gradually build up the necessary funds to support the trip. Look for additional communication in this newsletter on how you can help prepare for the auction or help on the day of the auction so that we can continue this valuable tradition for our students. We need everyone in the school community to come out and support this effort for our students! Health Office News – Mrs. Roto, R.N., B.S.N

Fall is a beautiful season and the weather has been ideal for playing outside and enjoying nature. However, as with other seasons, illnesses can flourish in autumn. The cooling air and changing weather patterns can hit your body hard, affecting everything from your blood pressure to how your fingers feel. Those with certain conditions might feel a particular sense of dread after the autumnal equinox, as seasonal variations in temperature can spur all kinds of health problems.

Cold weather may not be the only reason you get chills. Low temperatures can increase the likelihood of getting sick. The body is not as effective at fighting a virus when cold air enters the nose and upper airways, so viruses such as the common cold, the flu, COVID-19, and gastrointestinal illnesses often spread more easily in the winter.

Many researchers believe that exposure to cold weather can adversely affect a person's immune response, making it harder for the body to fight off infections. Reasons for this may include:

- Reduced vitamin D levels: During the winter, many people get less <u>vitamin</u> <u>D</u> due to reduced sun exposure. Vitamin D plays an <u>essential role</u> in maintaining the immune system and feeling of well-being
- Cooler temperatures may affect immune response:
- Blood vessel narrowing: Breathing in cold and dry air causes the blood vessels in the upper respiratory tract to narrow to conserve heat. This may prevent white blood cells from reaching the mucous membrane, making it harder for the body to fight germs.

While cold weather does not directly cause a cold, the viruses that cause colds may spread more easily in cooler temperatures. Various steps can help a person avoid getting sick during the colder months.

To avoid falling ill, practice these common and easy to do tasks:

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• Wash your hands.

<u>Clean your hands thoroughly</u> and often with soap and water. If soap and water aren't available, use an alcohol-based hand sanitizer.

• Disinfect your space.

Clean kitchen and bathroom countertops with disinfectant, especially when someone in your family has a cold. Be diligent about wiping down doorknobs and frequently touched surfaces.

• Use tissues and masks.

Sneeze and cough into tissues. Discard used tissues right away. Then thoroughly wash your hands. If you are wearing a mask, discard the mask and replace it with a clean one.

• Don't share.

Don't share drinking glasses or utensils with other family members. Use your own glass or disposable cups when you or someone else is sick. Label the cup or glass with the name of the person with the cold.

Strategies to boost your immunity:

- Eat a diet high in fruits and vegetables. High levels of vitamins C and A are found in many fruits and vegetables and strengthen the immune system
- **Exercise regularly.** Exercise causes changes in antibodies and white blood cells (WBCs). WBCs are the body's immune system cells that fight disease. These antibodies or WBCs circulate more rapidly, so they could detect illnesses earlier than they might have before
- **Get enough sleep.** Making sure your body has a chance to rest and recover from the day is important for your immune system to function at full strength. When we sleep, our bodies produce a protein called cytokines, which target infection and inflammation, creating an immune response.
- Keep current with all recommended vaccines. Vaccines prime your immune system to fight off infection.
- **Dress for the elements.** Wearing layers during the winter can help prevent physiological conditions that can make you more susceptible to contracting viruses, before they take hold in your body

The bottom line is that cold weather or being cold doesn't cause illness, but exposure to weather or other factors may weaken your ability to fight off illness.

Kindergarten – Ms. Garvie

October was a wonderful and eventful month for us here in kindergarten. During our Second Step lessons we learned that mistakes are okay, and we can practice and keep trying when we are learning new things. We also started learning about feelings and how to manage our emotions when we are having a strong feeling. We have established the routines and expectations of phonics, reading, and writing time. We each have our own phonics bags with white boards, magnetic letters, and other fun phonics activities to support our learning! During math, we counted collections and compared groups of objects using the terms more, fewer (or less), and equal. For science, we have been learning about October-related topics such as why some apples are red and some apples are green, and why pumpkins are so popular every fall. Our class also did a leaf hunt followed by a leaf investigation and leaf rubbings. It was also fun to do a pumpkin investigation! The children predicted how many lines and seeds were in the pumpkin, described the outside, and opened the pumpkin up to explore the inside. We all got to feel what the inside of the pumpkin is like. It was described as gooey, icky, slimy, and yucky.

We have jumped right into the new season with some other fun-filled events. The PreK and kindergarten classes started the month with a field trip to Buell's Apple Orchard. Then, we had another trip to the Eastford Public Library. The Eastford Fire Department came and taught us about fire safety. At the end of the month, it was such a treat to have the author Renata Bowers come to our school and do an assembly about her Freida B books!

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Grade 1 News – Mrs. Rhynhart

What happens to your shadow when you are not looking? It shrinks and then grows taller again! The first graders have been learning about the predictable patterns of the sun. When we wake up and the sun is low in the sky, our shadows are tall. At midday, when the sun is high in the sky our shadow shrinks. At the end of the day when the sun is low again, our shadow changes sides and grows tall again. Next, we will be learning about the predictable patterns of the moon! The first graders have also been busy learning about the many communities they are a part of and what their responsibilities are in each community. In our class community, all the students have a daily job that helps our classroom stay safe, clean, and run smoothly so we can all do our best learning. As November approaches, we look forward to learning about the election process and our responsibilities as members of our town, state, and federal communities. This month, the first graders will also work on strategies (or "tricks" as we call them!) to add numbers with larger sums, practice writing informational stories to share facts about the fall season and continue our reading development by focusing on new phonics skills and sight word recognition to improve our reading fluency. 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Grade 2 News – Mrs. Crocker-Lincoln

Happy November to all! We have lots to be thankful for at EES!

Recently, second-grade scientists worked on building prototypes of a birdhouse that would attract a bird of their own choosing. Students chose among finches, jays, woodpeckers, and cardinals. Considerations about the type of food the bird prefers, where the bird likes to stand or perch when it eats, and how the feeder could be kept safe from predators, such as a cat, were incorporated into the design.

Grade 2 scientific problem statements were then written.

Here is an example:

I want ______to come to my yard! I need a bird feeder with _____type of food and ______ for it to stand in. I will make the feeder safe from predators by ______.

As you can see, students individually created some amazing bird feeder prototypes.





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Grade 3 News – Mrs. Bisson

Third Graders were exceptional American Citizens this month! We spent our Shared Reading time learning all about the American Government. First, we learned about the Constitutional Convention, read the different articles of the Constitution, and discussed the importance of each one. We also learned about the Bill of Rights and other important amendments. Then, we moved on to learning all about Congress and the two different groups of elected representatives that help do important jobs for our country. We explored the process of how an idea becomes a bill and how that bill becomes a law.

We then wrote our own ideas for laws we would like to see in our country and worked hard to define and describe the different responsibilities of the Senate and House of Representatives.





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Grade 4 News – Ms. Dill

As parents of elementary school children, you play a crucial role. Your involvement and collaboration make a significant difference in their academic and personal growth. One essential way to foster this collaboration is through parent-teacher conferences, which are quickly approaching (December 12 and 13).

Here are four questions to ask your child's teacher that can foster a constructive dialogue, ultimately benefiting the child's education.

1. How is my child performing academically?

• This question helps provide insight about your child's progress including learning style and individual needs. It works to establish a shared vision for goal setting.

2. What are my child's social interactions like in class?

• Understanding how your child interacts with peers can give parents insights into a child's social skills and relationships. It may help address concerns early, before escalation.

3. What can I do at home to support my child's learning?

• Parents can ask for specific strategies or resources they can use to reinforce what their child is learning in school. This creates a partnership for success.

4. Are there any behavioral concerns I should be aware of?


• This question allows parents to address any potential issues and work with the teacher to support their child's behavior and engagement.

Conference slots seem to be over in the blink of an eye! These types of questions will help parents and teachers collaborate to support the child's success!


Math News – Mrs. Barlow

<u>Grade 5:</u> This group has been working with division and how to divide small numbers to get a fractional answer. This leads us to fraction multiplication, explicitly finding the fraction of a distance. We have now seen the area of rectangles with side lengths of mixed numbers or fractional side lengths.

<u>Grade 6</u> In Grade six, we talked about the surface area of many types of pyramids or prisms. We have found that using nets can make it easier to keep track of our math. Today, we started talking about perfect squares and exponents. We will be finishing up this unit shortly.



<u>**Grade 7**</u> did a fabulous job on their scale drawings—see some below. We have since moved on to proportional relationships. Students can now identify the constant of proportionality, write equations with variables, and graph points given values on a table.



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Grade 8: This group has finished its unit on rigid Transformations and moved on to dilations. We have learned to find similar and congruent shapes using rigid transformations and dilations. In the following few lessons, we will use what we know about similar triangles on a graph to understand how they relate to finding the slope of a line. This will lead to a couple of units on linear equations. Take a look at the terrific tessellations made by this group!







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<u>Algebra</u>: In Algebra, we have been working on writing, graphing, and solving inequalities. Some of these inequalities have been compound inequalities and absolute value inequalities. Students have taken to writing solution sets with mathematical symbols more than most of my groups. They might like the next unit that most don't, where they need to find the domain and range of a function!



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Science News – Mrs. Mead

Exciting things are happening in the middle school science room as most students are finishing up their first unit of study, and some are on to their second.



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Social Studies News – Mr. Kernan

Grade 8 has finished their review of the "Coming of the American Revolution." They were able to demonstrate an understanding of why this period led to the American Revolution. We also talked about how and why it still resonates today as our governing force. Throughout this work, we learned about the economic development of the colonies, the French and Indian War, Pontiac's War, and attempts to expand westward. Heading into November, we will be discussing and learning about our early republic, including the U.S. Constitution. In doing so, we will examine what our stances on foreign policy were, how we built an economy, and how we learned to transition power from one President to another.

Grades 6 and 7 have finished their review of the first empires, exploring topics such as ancient Mesopotamia, the significance of the Nile River, the Fertile Crescent, Judaism, and the development of law. Students showcased their knowledge through a choice board assignment, with options like creating maps, writing a journal from the perspective of a Phoenician, or using a Venn diagram to compare and contrast the Persians and Assyrians. We have now transitioned into studying Ancient Egypt, focusing on the Pharaohs and the lives of the Egyptian people.

Grade 5 continues our work on the earliest times of the Americas. We have worked to understand the Incas and Aztecs. We have also worked to understand how the Spanish and Portuguese came to the New World and settled in both habited and uninhabited lands. Going forward, we will continue to learn about geography and the early attempts by Europeans to

organize governments in the Americas. We will also compare and contrast the cultural structures of both native people and Europeans.

I wish all middle school families a very Happy Thanksgiving. I hope the time is relaxing and enjoyable.



Fifth Grade Bridge to Terabithia Final Project

As we conclude our reading of *Bridge to Terabithia*, I'm thrilled to share that our class will be creating a short film adaptation of the story. This project allows students to bring the book to life by deciding on the key scenes, adapting dialogue, and creatively representing the themes of friendship, courage, and imagination. Each student will have multiple roles, from acting and scriptwriting to set design and directing, ensuring they engage deeply with both the content and the collaborative process. Through this experience, students will develop skills in summarizing, character analysis, and storytelling, while also building confidence and teamwork. They are very excited and are already working hard!

We recently completed our second spider web discussion, this time focusing on the similarities and differences between the book *Bridge to Terabithia* and its movie adaptation, as well as exploring why the director might have made certain changes. Once again, the students did an outstanding job, demonstrating thoughtful insights and active engagement in the discussion.




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Finally, they completed a "Salsich Challenge" that involved finding a solution to a complex team problem. They solved it by using the web structure which must involve everyone working together at high levels.



Six and Seventh Grade Fantasy Writing Unit

Our students are currently immersed in designing their own fantasy worlds as part of an exciting writing unit! They're creating unique settings, characters, and magical systems that will form the foundation of their stories. By focusing on world-building, character development, and conflict design, students are learning how to construct a well-rounded fantasy narrative from the ground up. These early stages are sparking a lot of creativity and discussion as they imagine every detail of their story's universe, preparing them for the next steps in crafting their fantasy tales. Here are some of the fantasy world maps, but keep in mind that they are not finished.



Eighth Grade Narrative Writing Unit

This week, students are wrapping up their NWEA testing, and I'm proud of the hard work they've put into showing their growth and skills. Next week, we'll be turning our focus back to the narrative writing unit, as students work to finalize their stories. They've spent time developing plot structure, exploring character depth, and adding vivid sensory details to bring their narratives to life. As they revise and edit, they'll ensure their work reflects the advanced narrative techniques we've practiced. I look forward to sharing the creativity and effort they've put into their writing!



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Art News – Ms. Weinland

CLAY TIC TAC TOE BOARDS AND CHARACTER VESSELS

Eighth-grade students recently wrapped up a clay unit, where they explored various hand-building, sculpting, and glazing techniques. Through this experience, students transformed their creative visions into themed Tic Tac Toe boards and unique vessels inspired by animal or human characteristics. These projects allowed students to develop their craftsmanship and showcase their artistic expressions in imaginative, three-dimensional forms.



TIM BURTON-INSPIRED SPOOKY SELFIES

Sixth-grade students created spooky selfies in the whimsical style of Tim Burton, focusing on exaggerated features like oversized eyes, a small nose and mouth, a long neck, and "helmet hair." Inspired by Burton's monochromatic approach, they concentrated on shading and value, using smudging techniques with color sticks to achieve a 3D effect. Through blending and highlighting, students practiced chiaroscuro to capture light and shadow, bringing their spooky selfies to life with Burton's iconic, slightly eerie charm.



STUDENT ARTWORK ON DISPLAY AT EASTFORD PUBLIC LIBRARY

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WATERCOLOR WITH PEN AND INK

Fifth-grade students transformed repetitive arched lines into a vibrant underwater world filled with water and sea life using pen and ink and liquid watercolors. By layering their ink designs with bold watercolor washes, they brought their imaginative aquatic scenes to life, exploring the interplay between detailed line work and fluid color.



VAN GOGH INSPIRED SUNFLOWER COLLAGE

Second-grade students learned about French Impressionist artist Vincent Van Gogh and his use of layering and bold color. After studying his sunflower still lifes, they painted paper in warm colors and tore it to form sunflower petals, arranging them on a cool-colored background for contrast.



LAYERED CAKE COLLAGE

Kindergarteners learned about collage through the sweet, colorful artwork of artist Wayne Thiebaud. They created their own layered paper cakes, decorating each "layer" with vibrant paint sticks to mimic the delicious textures and colors the artist is famous for.

This year has gotten off to a very busy start!


In Enrichment, students began the school year with learning about analogies. We have been using a strategy to help us figure out missing words. First, we analyze the relationship between the two words of the first word pair. Then, we look at the first word in the second word pair and try to figure out a word that is related to it in the same way in which the first two words are related. Students have enjoyed being "word detectives!"

On a different note, you may remember that on Saturday, May 11, Eastford's town-wide event, "Experience Eastford," was held. To commemorate the day, students, staff, and community members were invited to use paint to decorate an individual fabric square for a quilt. Looking ahead, our next unit will focus on **Goal Setting**. This is a critical life skill that will help students develop strategies for success in both their personal and academic lives.


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In the Goal Setting Unit, students will:

All Open Burning is Strictly Prohibited in Eastford

Due to extremely high fire danger in our area, all open burning is strictly prohibited in Eastford at this time. This includes leaf burning, the use of fire pits and outdoor grilling. Please exercise extreme caution, especially when disposing of smoking materials outdoors.

Open Burning Permits will not be issued until the fire danger risk is reduced to Medium or Low risk conditions. Note that today's forest fire danger report remains at a Very High level: https://portal.ct.gov/deep/forestry/forest-fire/forest-firedanger-report.

An emergency burn ban is now also in effect for all Connecticut State Parks, Forests, and Wildlife Management areas, prohibiting the use of all outdoor grills, fire pits and campfires, kindling and use of flame outdoors. CT DEEP and local agencies are working to contain several active fires across the state.
