From the Principal's Desk

Dear Families,

Happy New Year! I hope all of our Eastford Elementary School families are enjoying a happy and healthy beginning to 2025! It looks like the colder winter weather is now upon us in full force. For those that don't know, when there is inclement or unsafe weather forecast for our area, local Superintendents conference with a weather professional about the expected or current conditions, and generally, a joint decision is reached about how schools will respond. Many districts send students to The Woodstock Academy, so we try to make a decision that is in the best interests of both our high school students, who are out waiting for the bus at 5:30 a.m., and our elementary students who don't head out for the bus until much later in the morning. In addition, we also consult with the First Selectman and the town road crew as needed to fully assess the conditions present specifically in Eastford.

Please remember that we take children outside for recess unless the temperature and/or windchill make it too dangerous to do so. Students need to be dressed properly in order to participate in outdoor recess. Snow pants and snow boots are required for children to play in the snow. Please send these with your child when there is snow on the ground.

By now, most of you are familiar with our procedures for announcing **school closings, late openings, and any other unexpected changes to our school calendar.** Radio station WINY and television channels WFSB and WVIT will carry announcements about school delays, cancellations, and early closings. You will also receive a text message, email, and voicemail from our automated emergency alert system. Additionally, you may wish to sign up for free text alerts of closings, delays, and cancellations from the local news stations by going to their respective websites. Please notify me or the school office if you are not receiving automated emergency alerts so that we can make any necessary changes to correct this.

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The **PTO's Giving Tree** collection has once again been very successful! Thanks to all who were able to purchase a snowflake and make a donation this year. Lastminute contributions will still be accepted through January 13. The money raised will support Eastford's Food Pantry and families in need in our school community. The combined effort will bring some relief to Eastford families throughout the year.

I would also like to thank the many local organizations and groups that have generously worked to provide additional holiday cheer for many of our families and students. We have been able to assist families with food, clothing, school supplies, toys, gifts, and other needs. Please don't hesitate to reach out to our school counselor, Mrs. Schleicher, or to me if you or someone you know is struggling and could use some support.

The Board of Education is beginning to prepare its **budget for the 2025-26** school year. Citizens who would like to be informed about our budget development may attend the budget meetings, all of which are public and are held in-person at the school, with a virtual option to join as well. Please contact the school office if you would like information to connect virtually to one or more of the meetings that are scheduled for:

January 9, 2025, at 6:00 PM – Regular BOE meeting; January 21, 2025, at 6:00 PM – Finance Committee; January 30, 2025, at 6:00 PM – Finance Committee; and February 13, 2025, at 5:00 PM – Prior to the Regular BOE meeting if needed

Registration is now open for our **2025-2026 preschool and kindergarten** classes. **To be eligible for kindergarten**, students must be Eastford residents and be 5 years old or turning 5 years old by **September 1, 2025.** This is a relatively new eligibility requirement established by the State Department of Education and the Office of Early Childhood. Our **preschool program** is funded through School Readiness and the Office of Early Childhood and while it is housed in our public school, **it is not a public-school program**. To be eligible, students must be at least 3 years old or turning 3 years old by September 1, 2025. **Enrollment is based on family financial needs and student developmental needs** and is not guaranteed for all Eastford students. A **needs assessment survey** will be sent out in February to all families with children under the age of 5. Please take a few minutes to fill out and return the survey if you have young children in your home. This information helps us to plan for the future educational needs of the Eastford community. Please contact the school office if you have any questions.

I also want to remind everyone about our Transportation Policy for students. Students in grades PK and K should be **met at the bus stop** by a

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parent/guardian or designated caregiver. Students in **grades 1-3** should have a parent/guardian or designated caregiver **visible** before the driver will let the child off the bus. If there are changes to your regular dismissal routine, **parents must notify the school in writing in advance of the change**. Additionally, students who plan to stay after school to watch sporting events should request permission prior to attending an event using the designated form for spectators. Students who are signed up to participate in an after-school activity or academic support will only be excused by a parent by advanced written notice, or by the school nurse if they are being sent home sick. Last minute phone requests are very difficult to manage and will not be honored.

Congratulations to **citizens of the trimester** for the first trimester: **Harrison Demers in grade 2** and **Aaron Minor in grade 8**. They were nominated by their teachers for demonstrating the qualities of good citizenship and were recognized at the Board of Education meeting on December 12, 2024. Congratulations to you both for this well-deserved honor! I would also like to congratulate students who made the **Honor Roll** for the first trimester. This includes students in grades 6-8 who earned High Honors, Honors, and Recognition. A listing of students in each category is included elsewhere in the Newsletter.

Families should be on the lookout for mid-term progress reports. These will go home with students on January 17, 2025, and indicate your child's progress at the midpoint of the second trimester.

There is no school on Monday, January 20, 2025, in honor of Martin Luther King, Jr.'s birthday.

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Grade 1 News – Mrs. Rhynhart

Welcome to the new year! This month, the first-grade scientists will be learning about nature's patterns in the night. You may see a first grader out at night looking for the phase of the moon, the Big Dipper, or the North Star (with their family's permission of course!) We will also be expanding our word knowledge as we learn about "glued sounds" in words such as **ang**, **ing**, **ong and ung**, as well as expanding the sight words that we can read and spell automatically. The firstgrade mathematicians will be learning strategies to quickly and easily add and subtract numbers through 20, and our social skills curriculum this month will focus on developing empathy by recognizing our own feelings and others' feelings by using facial, body and contextual clues. We will also enjoy our monthly trip to the Eastford Public Library as well as discuss the contributions of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. to our country. The first graders are anxious to see the flakes fly in this month so they can get out and enjoy some fun in the snow! Happy January!

Frog Research Report

Grade 2 researchers are "jumping in" to an informational frog research report. This is a culminating task that will help students make connections to what they have learned in their reading, science, and writing classes. Students will focus on the life cycle of the frog by applying what they learned in shared reading class from several books on the topic to applying their knowledge from English Language Arts about how to formulate an informative piece of writing. Additionally, students will incorporate technology to make a Seesaw video presentation to share with families. This is a big goal for us, but we are up for new challenges in 2025!

Mysteries

Second graders are currently exploring narrative mystery text structure and elements, and are practicing using narrative story elements to accurately retell a story. Students will apply what they've learned by actively participating in oral whole group and partner discussions and completing daily written responses about each book. The lessons in this unit work together to reinforce students' understanding of multiple narrative mystery text structures, and help students understand why it is beneficial to compare texts with similar structures.



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
Grade 3 News – Mrs. Bisson

Grade 3 students have been learning all about the weather in our shared reading book *Twisters and Other Terrible Storms*. We learned about high pressure and low pressure in the atmosphere and how those changes can affect the weather. We also learned about weather disasters such as tornadoes, hurricanes, and blizzards.

To further support our learning, we began our Weather & Climate unit in science. We created a model water cycle by pouring warm water into a cup and observing the changes that occurred when we "trapped" the water vapor that tried to escape. We used scientific words like "evaporation" and "condensation" to describe what was happening!







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Grade 4 News – Ms. Dill

Winter is a wonderful time for families to come together and create lasting memories through engaging indoor activities. By embracing the season, families can explore new hobbies, strengthen relationships, and promote learning while enjoying the cozy atmosphere of home! Here are 5 indoor activities families can do together that also promote learning:

- 1. **Cooking**: Involve children in meal preparation. Use recipes to teach measurements, fractions, and following instructions. Discuss nutritional values to promote healthy eating habits.
- 2. **Science Experiments**: Conduct simple science experiments using household items. For example, create a volcano with baking soda and vinegar to explore chemical reactions or grow crystals using sugar or salt.
- 3. **Board Games and Puzzles**: Playing board games can be educational. They help with math, vocabulary, and strategy. Puzzles can help with problem-solving skills and critical thinking.
- 4. **Reading**: Set aside time for family reading sessions. Choose a variety of books and discuss the stories, characters, themes, or main ideas to enhance comprehension and critical thinking.
- 5. **(Virtual) Museum Tours**: Tour museums or historical sites. Many institutions offer online experiences that provide educational content about art, history, and science.

Engaging in family activities during the winter fosters connection, creativity, and a love for learning in a warm and inviting environment.

Happy New Year!

Grade 5

I'm excited to kick off another year and continue our work together. This month, our grade five students will delve into the colonies of the 18th century, focusing on the French and Indian War and its connection to the American Revolution. Writing will take center stage as we sharpen persuasive writing skills. I'm looking forward to a productive and enriching month!

Grades 6 and 7

We've embarked on an exploration of Ancient Greece, comparing its structure and influence on modern government and architecture. Students have begun to draw parallels between Ancient Greece and our Constitution, uncovering the impact of Greek ideas on our government framework. We've also explored the rise of Athens and Sparta, setting the stage for discussions on Greek mythology, the gods and goddesses, and the rise and fall of Alexander the Great and the Greek Empire.

Grade 8

As we transition from the end of the American Revolution to the birth of a new nation, grade eight students are examining the Constitution's role in daily life and the development of our government. We've been exploring how different historical eras were shaped by the people of the time, laying the groundwork for our future focus: the American Civil War. This month, we'll begin with the Thomas Jefferson era, diving into the complexities and challenges of this pivotal time in American history.

They are about to begin a variety of exciting projects, including clay, printmaking, drawing, painting, collage, fiber art, and sculpture. 
<u>Grades 3-8</u> We started Speed-Ball in December which we will be wrapping up in the middle of January. Afterwards we will be starting a unit on Badminton.


