## From the Principal's Desk

Dear Parents and Guardians,

Welcome to February! Now that we are experiencing some colder weather and have had a bit of snow, it really feels like winter has arrived! Please be sure to send your children to school prepared for a variety of weather. We plan to have outdoor recess every day unless the temperatures and/or wind chill bring the outside temperature below 20 degrees or it is too wet to be out. At times, the indoor temperatures can fluctuate as well, so being prepared with layers also helps to keep kids comfortable.

When there is inclement weather overnight or early morning, the Superintendent consults with area Superintendents and the Eastford Public Works Department to determine if conditions are safe for students and staff to travel to school. Typically, we issue a two-hour delay or announce that school will be closed if conditions are unsafe. In rare circumstances, it may be more appropriate to issue a three-hour delay rather than a full school closure. If area schools and The Woodstock Academy issue a two or three-hour delay, we would be forced to follow suit to accommodate busing to area high schools. If this were to happen, it would be announced in the same manner that our delays and closings are typically announced – via our website, emergency notification system, and on stations WFSB, WVIT (NBC CT), and WINY radio. Everything would shift two or three hours, respectively. We do not hold half-day preschool if there is a two- or three-hour delay. The chart below shows the starting times for each scenario:

Again, a three-hour delay **is not typical**, and it will only be used if necessary in rare circumstances. If you have not received alerts, emails, and text messages from our alert notification system when we have had weather-related changes, please let me know so that I can be sure to add your contact information to our database. is to be able to quickly reach at least one household member with these important notifications.

February is shaping up to be a busy month full of activities and special events! Global School Play Day for all students will be celebrated on Wednesday, February 5 and the 100<sup>th</sup> day of school celebration will take place on Thursday, February 6 for our students in the younger grades. And of course, Valentine's Day is February 14! Please carefully read information from your child's teachers regarding any celebration plans. Students may share Valentine cards and other small tokens as appropriate for the grade level, but due to the number of allergies across our grade levels, we no longer celebrate with food, candy, and special treats. As we turn the corner into March, staff and students at EES plan to celebrate Read Across America Day (March 2) with special Literacy activities throughout the week of March 3-7. We will have guest readers, literacy-themed spirit days, and other reading-related activities throughout the week. Stay tuned for more information.

Keep in mind that there will be an **early dismissal** for students on **Friday**, **February 14** for staff professional development, and **two scheduled days off in February** for Presidents' Day: Monday, February 17, and Tuesday, February 18. This provides for an extra-long weekend!

**Registration for Preschool and Kindergarten is now open. Registration forms** are available on the school website (<u>www.eastfordct.org</u>) and in the school office. School Readiness Needs Assessment Surveys and registration information has also been mailed to families with children ages birth to four years old. Please share this information with any Eastford families that have young children and encourage them to register or call the school if they have questions. The Eastford Readiness Council meets on the first Tuesday of each month at 5:30 pm. The Readiness Council oversees our preschool program and **assures compliance** with National Association for the Education of Young Children (**NAEYC**) **standards** and the Connecticut Office of Early Childhood (**OEC**).

To be eligible for preschool and kindergarten, students must turn **3 and 5 years old by September 1** of the fall that they plan to attend. The Eastford Board of Education and the State of Connecticut allow for families to request a waiver of this law if they believe their child is ready to enter kindergarten early. Please contact the school office at 860-974-1130 if you have specific questions regarding the kindergarten entrance age or the waiver process.

Our winter concert that was postponed in December has been rescheduled for **March 19**. Our singers and instrumental players are busy practicing new material to share with families and the student body. We will share more details about the spring concert as the date approaches.

Looking ahead, all students in grades three through eight will participate in **Smarter Balanced Assessment Consortium (SBAC)** testing this spring. Students in grades five and eight will also take the **Next Generation Science Standards (NGSS)**

Assessment for Science during the same time period. We will provide more specific dates as they become available. Eastford typically begins testing in April and will conclude by the deadline of May 30.

Our calendar of after-school enrichment offerings is included in this Newsletter for your reference. New activities are added each month. If you have signed your child up for an activity, please be courteous to others and let us know if they will not be able to attend on the day of the program so that another child can benefit and join the program. If you or someone you know has a skill or activity they would like to share with students, please let us know so we can see how we might fit you into our calendar!

I would like to remind everyone that our parent groups continue to meet each month. The Readiness Council meets on the first Tuesday of each month at 5:30 pm via Zoom, and the PTO meets each month on the second Tuesday at 6:00 pm. # Kindergarten News – Ms. Garvie

# Grade 4 News – Ms. Dill



Eastford's Portrait of a Learner focuses on six attributes that promote essential skills vital for future success. This month grade 4 students focused on effective collaboration – demonstrating the ability to appropriately interact within a group to set and achieve a common goal. They actively listened to and reflected on ideas shared by others to complete a mini-research project about renewable and nonrenewable resources used around the world.

In fifth grade, we've had a great time diving into the elements of narrative writing. We've worked on everything from showing character motivations to using advanced dialogue tags, and students have been applying these skills in their fantasy narratives. The project has been a lot of hard work, but also a lot of fun, and it's been amazing to see everyone's creativity shine through in their stories. They share parts of their work regularly, and there is a feeling of being in a community of writers!

Coming up, students will be turning their narratives into short books, complete with their own illustrations. I'm excited to see their stories come to life in this creative format!

The sixth and seventh graders have been busy sharpening their summarizing skills with nonfiction articles, which they've then used to fuel their debate abilities. We had our first debates on three thought-provoking questions that the students came up with: 1. Should students be able to listen to music while working? 2. Is less homework better? 3. Is hands-on learning the best way to learn? Both sides of these debates represented their position well, even if it wasn't their personal belief. Everyone jumped in with enthusiasm, stayed organized, and were super respectful, making it a great experience for all. Looking ahead, the students will be preparing for their final debate of the year, where they'll get to showcase everything they've learned about crafting strong arguments and presenting them with confidence.

The eighth graders just wrapped up a poetry unit that was all about creativity and expression. They had fun with a "March Madness" bracket of poems, created and illustrated their own poems, and worked hard on perfecting their rhyme schemes and selecting just the right figurative language. It was exciting to see them push their creative boundaries and express their ideas so thoughtfully.

Coming up, the eighth grade will focus on mastering the essential middle school skill of reading and summarizing nonfiction texts, where they'll refine their ability to identify key ideas, analyze supporting details, and summarize the information clearly. This will be a valuable skill as they move forward in their academic journey.

## Science News – Mrs. Mead





Grade 5 science students have been studying water on Earth in Mystery Science. In this activity, students worked with saltwater solutions and created salt flats in a model landscape from "ocean water".



Grade 6 students are exploring exothermic chemical reactions, looking for different temperature changes as they experiment with various amounts of reactants in each trial.

Grade 7 students are learning about the features of Earth that supply energy. Here, they are testing the permeability of different kinds of sedimentary rock to discover how oil reserves travel and settle underground.





Grade 8 students have been investigating climate change. In this activity, students are investigating how the curvature of the planet affects the thermal energy we receive. They have angled black paper respective to a light source to model Earth receiving sunlight.

# Social Studies News – Mr. Kernan

#### <u>Grade 5</u>

Our grade five students have been diving into the American Revolution, uncovering the key events and turning points that shaped our nation's history. Recently, they explored the significance of the **Battle of Saratoga**, often called the war's turning point, where the American victory convinced France to join the fight. They also learned about the **Battle of Yorktown**, the final major conflict where General Washington's army, with French support, forced the British surrender, securing American independence.

Through engaging activities, map studies, and discussions, students are gaining a deeper understanding of the courage, strategy, and alliances that led to victory. Be sure to ask them what surprised them most about the Revolution!

#### Grade 6 and Grade 7

This month, our grade six and seven students embarked on an exciting journey along the Silk Road! Through interactive lessons, engaging discussions, and hands-on activities, students explored how this vast trade network connected cultures across Asia, the Middle East, and Europe.

They discovered the exchange of goods like silk, spices, and precious metals, but more importantly, they learned how ideas, religions, and technologies spread along the route, shaping civilizations. From examining ancient trade maps to simulating barter exchanges, students gained a deeper understanding of the Silk Road's lasting impact on the world.

Ask your child about their favorite discovery—whether it was the legendary travels of Marco Polo, the bustling markets of Baghdad, or the role of the Silk Road in shaping modern globalization!

#### Grade 8

Our grade eight students have been learning about the creation of the U.S. Constitution and exploring how the Founding Fathers debated and shaped the framework of our government. They've examined the challenges faced at the Constitutional Convention, from balancing state and federal power to ensuring individual rights.

Through interactive discussions and document analysis, students are gaining insight into the compromises that led to the Constitution's final draft, including the Great Compromise and the Three-Fifths Compromise. Ask your student about the key debates that shaped our nation and why the Constitution remains a living document today!
